Kaiapoi History Tour Report

We had a good start with 15 cars at the PMH carpark ready to go at 10.30am. Tony Childs handed out our route sheets and we were off to the Barbadoes Street Cemetery, which is one of the oldest in Christchurch.

On through Avonside, Brighton, Travis Wetlands and a huge housing development I never knew existed. Next Brooklands, then over the old Waimak River bridge and we were soon in Kaiapoi at the site of the old freezing works - it was a huge place in its day.

We moved on with many historic sites to look at: the 1874 foot swing bridge; Mandeville Tavern 1858 and still open; Blackwells Store 1871 and still going strong. We saw the old Post Office, band

rotunda, the Art Deco picture theatre and the Court House, which was in action from 1890.

We all stopped at the 1872 Railway Station and parked on the wharf near the old river ship Tuhoe. The wind was a bit cold so we moved on passing the old Woollen Mill and the mill workers' houses. the Blue Skies Scout complex and had our lunch at Tony and Jeanette's residence and their Studebaker museum.

Over our lunch and coffee we wandered about and examined the enormous collection of vehicle memorabilia - photos, manuals, models and his latest creation in a really neat yellow.

We then toured some very green farmlands and stopped at a rather quaint house - plaster over dirt or straw bales and with a grass roof. Finally we met at the historic Flax Mill for coffee and a snack, having completed a most interesting journey.

Kaiapoi proved to be very interesting. It is not a large town but it has managed to retain and restore more of its history than most other towns of similar size.
