AUSTRALIAN ODYSSEY 2012

DAY 1: We began with a group breakfast at the Gatehouse Sunbury organised by Robin & Barbara. We were all keen to get underway and enjoyed the driving through the Victorian farming area in the morning and the Great Coastal Highway in the afternoon. We went to a local RSL for dinner.

DAY2: A great starting place by the beach watching race horses having a swim as part of their training. First stop was at the Tower Hill Reserve which is in the crater of an extinct volcano. It was abuzz with wildlife - Emu - Kangaroo - snake - porcupine - great bird life. Some members did a nature walk. Lunch was at Portland another historic town - Tram - Botanical Gardens and the compulsory Motor Museum. More lovely coastal driving and the last gem was the Blue Lake. Group BBQ tonight - Ellen & Graeme the shoppers. We celebrated Barbara Fletcher's birthday at the BBQ.

DAY 3: 8am start at the Umperston Sink Hole in Mount Gambia. A long day 458km. Very strong winds &

torrential rain along parts of the route. Lovely old towns with so much history - lolly shops - cafes and interesting people. Long Stretches of road with no sign of life! It was great to cross the Murray River and marvel at the 2 bridges. Question sheet involved much discussion between driver & navigator. Great to see the Pelicans in flight battleing the winds.

DAY 4: We had a overnight stay quite close to Adelaide but Robin managed to route us on a very interesting tour through the McLaren Valley wine region. We also visited Goolwa - Port Elliot & Victor Harbour. Our accommodation was near the beach.

DAY 5: Bay to Birdwood day! We were all up early and ready to go the 70km's to The National Motor Museum at Birdwood. We delayed our start to watch the first of the Vintage vehicles pass by the Motel. The vehicles had to be pre 1955 but most were in the very old category. There were about 1500 vehicles on display. The organising committee had a great programme for the day and the rain stayed away.

DAY 6 : Free Day Graeme & Ellen organised a group BBQ.

DAY 7: We climbed over the Adelaide Hills to behold a great vista of a large plain. We mostly followed the Murray River north and it was amazing to see the different aspects of the river. There are 11 free ferry's that cross the river as part of the National Highway programme. There are 6 locks in South Australia. We passed Lake Bonney where in 1964 Donald Campbell tried for a World Water Speed record. Sadly not to be as the lake was too small and there was always a dangerous ripple. We spent the night in Renmark.

DAY 8: Port Pirie was our destination to-day. Huge areas of land in cultivation & then huge areas as waste land. We have enjoyed seeing the wildlife - Kangaroors - Emu - All Kinds of Reptiles - Sheep - Goats as we drive along. Lunch stop was Clare - we then passed through several historic towns one being Snow town which was famous for the "Bodies in the Barrell" case. Port Broughton had a very long jetty.

DAY 9: Port - Pirie to Port Augusta. Beautiful old towns - Murray - Melrose - Willmington. So interesting it was Lunch Time and we were still 2 hours from the lunch stop. Across wide plains to the ghost town of Iron Knob and the Coastal town of Whyalla. Another of Graeme & Ellen's BBQ's for tea. Everyone takes a turn at cooking or chopping salads- great Social times.

DAY 10: A big journey to-day all the way to Broken Hill long stretches of road - desert each side and many dead kangaroos along the way. We began by climbing through some of the Flinders Ranges through the towns of Quorn & Orroroo. In Orroroo there is a "magnetic hill" that may pull your car along even when it is in neutral. The Korean cars had too much plastic & aluminium to work but the Holden showed us how it was done! Thanks Ray & Barbara. Peterborough was an interesting lunch stop before we tackled the next 255km's with only 3 very small road houses along the way.

We arrived at the Roadhouse ready to use toilet and perhaps buy a snack but the signs were so unwelcoming we kept going - not much further along there was a very nice Rest Area that we were able to use. We arrived in Wentworth for a lunch stop and visited the Junction of the Darling & Murray Rivers. There was a bit of a rush on as it was "Bathhurst" day and some were keen to get to see the end of the race. In the Mildura Port area there was a Houseboat of sorts - the owner was an eccentric gentleman - the boat was full of junk had hens that were scratching away on the bank. Some of us were invited on board to listen to some singing and possibly buy a CD. He was gone by morning off on an adventure to Renmark.

Day13: All too soon the last day and a drive to Echuca. Swan Hill was the main town to-day and a highlight for us was a visit to the Flying Boat Museum at Lake Boga.
