The downside to all this is that I also have a touch of Alzheimer's and so my garage is full of duplicated car spares. Of course being a hoarder I see no reason to get rid of them.

Anyway, what do you care about my own personal afflictions. It's time to get to the point. One of my favourite items to hunt down is tyres. I grew up around tyres as Dad used to steal seconds from the skip outside the Tyresole remoulding factory where he worked. He would bring them home, lug them up three flights of stairs and hide them in the attic. On the weekend he would lug them back downstairs and flog them to his mates or barter with the neighbours for bags of cement or cabbages. Which is the reason I know, having attended so many funerals thanks to those exploding remoulds, why today's cheap Chinese tyres are such a bad choice.

Go to Scobie Tyres on Parkhouse Road. He fitted me up with a set of Maxim tyres for my Golf GTi. Awesome tyres. But that's because Darren Scobie has also been around tyres since he was a kid. His dad started up the company in Christchurch in the 1970's. Not your usual Pikey tyre salesman, Darren gives sound advice and cares about providing a decent product. He reckons that most of the cars smashed up in wreckers yards have cheap Chinese or bald tyres on them. This is backed up by NZTA road casualty data which states that the number one cause of road fatalities in New Zealand is the driver losing control of the vehicle. Tyres imported into NZ should be subjected to a tyre braking test to ensure we maintain a consistent standard. Darren even offered to give the Police a lecture on tyre safety but lo and behold they rejected his kind offer. Aren't the Police supposed to care about road safety. Yeh right!

So the Jaguar XJR went through a warrant last month and the mechanic said the near side front tyre was wearing unevenly. That was all I needed and the hunt for a set of four replacement tyres was initiated with gusto. The Jag is our winter weekend runabout so the tyres had to have good wet weather grip. I visited just about every tyre shop in Christchurch, surfed the internet for shops in Auckland to compare available brands and prices. Went to tyrereview.co.uk to check out summer tyre tests and finally concluded after 500 miles of travel, \$200 worth of phone calls, a surcharge on my internet bill of \$50 for exceeding 100GB of data that the best value for money performance tyre in the world right now isDrum Roll Please.....

The Goodyear Eagle F1 Asymmetric 3.

Purchased from KATS in Kaiapoi. They were actually \$35 cheaper than a basic set of Kumho from tyreshoponline.co.nz. The Goodyears cost \$1740 for a set of four when back in 2012 I had purchased four Nexen N1000 for \$535 for a set of four. The rise in tyre prices over this time has been nothing short of spectacular.

The main point of interest here is that the top quality European performance tyres haven't gone up as much as you'd think. Back in 2012 a set of continentals was quoted at \$1350. It's the cheap and mid range tyres that have had the most dramatic price increases...... But only in New Zealand. Cheap tyres are still cheap in the UK and Australia but we are paying more for them here. We are being succoured into thinking that a more expensive Chinese tyre must be a better quality tyre. They are death traps and should be avoided at all costs when for a few dollars more you could be driving on a safer premium grade tyre.

Two things I instilled in my kids. Don't drive in anyone else's car as they might be drunk, drugged up or simply a complete idiot and don't put Chinese tyres on your car. My daughter lives in Brisbane and she is a chip off the old block. Drives like Lewis Hamilton in her Kia Rio. When she needed tyres I arranged a set of four Hankook's over the internet. All she had to do was rock up to her local tyre shop and they were waiting for her. I just need to keep her as safe as I possibly can.
